How Shall We Use this Freedom of Ours?


For you were called to freedom, siblings, only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become enslaved to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Galatians 5:13-14

In this month marked by celebrations of the birth of our nation, we are thinking much about *freedom*—about those who labored to secure it, and those who have labored to extend it to all people, and those who work even now to ensure our freedoms from want and fear, our freedoms of speech and religion.

I think about the thread of freedom that runs through our sacred scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. From God's instructions to Adam and Eve, "You are free to eat of every tree... *except*," to the freedom God sent Moses to secure for the slaves in Egypt, "Let my people go so that they might be free to worship me," to the freedom Christ secured for us on the cross.

In his letter to the Galatians, Paul writes about the right use of that freedom. This freedom is not an opportunity for self-indulgence or to devour one another, but it is an opportunity to serve one another.

In America, we are doubly blessed, for we live in a land that claims freedom as part of our national identity. As citizens of this nation and citizens of God's beloved community, we are called to live out our freedom responsibly, seeking not our own comfort or our own way, but the well-being of all.

In his missionary work, Paul is amplifying Jesus' message, "You have been set free for love." May we use our freedom well as we live into the vision of the Founder of our faith, the One who came so that we might know God's love and share it.

Visualizing Freedom

In his January 1941 address to Congress, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt articulated his vision for a postwar world founded on four basic human freedoms: freedom of speech, freedom of worship, freedom from want, and freedom from fear. Norman Rockwell, one of the preeminent painters of the day, decided to illustrate those freedoms. It was a daunting task, but the results were worth the effort—those paintings of "The Four Freedoms" have become American icons. In 2019, a group of artists took on the challenge of reinterpreting those paintings to represent a more diverse America than was pictured in the Rockwell paintings. Hank Willis Thomas, Emily Shur, Eric Gottesman, and Wyatt Gallery produced and displayed the works in an exhibition titled, "For Freedoms: Where Do We Go From Here?" at the International Center of Photography Museum.

At right is their inclusive representation of freedom of worship for today. Both the original and the recreation reflect the key American tenet that we must all be free to worship according to the dictates of our own conscience. 



Webinar Notes: How Revitalization Is Really Working in Some Churches

Thom Rainer & Sam Rainer, authors of *Autopsy of a Deceased Church* and *The Post-Quarantine Church*, recently hosted a webinar discussing trends in church revitalization. It focused on things that their research demonstrates are effective in helping churches survive and thrive in today's post-Christendom, post-pandemic world.

Happily, Westminster is already moving in very positive directions. This is a summary of the Rainers' findings and what they might mean for us.

Trend #1: Churches are intentional about knowing their community

Churches benefit enormously from doing in-depth analysis of the communities they serve. The Rainers recommend accessing detailed demographic information to feed that analysis. Successful churches are intentional about looking like their community—striving to engage with its different groups and subgroups in a way that is Christlike and meaningful to them and to us. Finally, successful churches love and serve their community. One church they described has committed to serving foster children as a key way of connecting and serving. Some members became foster families, and the whole church supports foster families, both internal and external.

WPC Observation:

- We have obtained excellent, mission-focused demographic information from Presbyterian Foundation, and have a "data divers" group analyzing the material and discussing what it might mean for us. Stay tuned for input from that team.
- God has already provided us with strong connection to the foster family network of Greenwood. We can continue to build on this as we seek other opportunities for service and outreach.

Trend #2: Churches are developing discipleship paths

Beyond just attracting and welcoming visitors, effective churches provide clear pathways for evolving from interested party to member to mature Christian. Successful churches offer many different opportunities for spiritual growth for every age group. Having inquirer/newcomer classes is particularly valuable. Another key idea is to encourage small group participation. Research shows that people engaged in a small group are five times more likely to stay with a church for five years or more.

WPC Observation:

- Our recent values exercise confirmed that we see *spiritual growth* as our priority. Our programming emphasizes faith formation for children and for adults.
- The Presbyterian 101 series that just finished is an excellent example of helping newcomers deepen their understanding of what it means to be a Christian at WPC.
- The new Books & Brown Bags study is an excellent example of our commitment to developing and supporting small-group activities.

Trend #3: Churches are focusing on conversion, not transfer growth

Churches today that are growing are generally growing the New Testament way—by sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ and bringing in *new* believers. With the rise of "none of the above" religious affiliation as the largest demographic, it doesn't help to just lure members from one church to another. As a result, outreach efforts need to focus on evangelism, targeting the non-believer/unchurched. And that means you can't rely on using "insider" language and knowledge to reach the intended audience.

WPC Observation:

• This is a true challenge for most congregations. Keep praying about how God will use us and where the Holy Spirit is leading us.

Trend #4: Church leaders are changing their mindset from recruiting seat-fillers to making disciples

Similar to Trend #3, the point here is to remain focused on The Great Commission and The Greatest Commandments. Successful churches focus on what they have to offer their neighbors (e.g., the Gospel, love, support, connection), not on what they need those neighbors to bring to the church (e.g., money, volunteer time).

WPC Observation:

Westminster is making a conscious effort to keep disciple-making and spiritual growth
as the driving forces of our outreach. At the same time, we also do celebrate and
appreciate the contributions of every type that our newest members and friends are
bringing to our congregational life.

Trend #5: Church leaders are focusing more on horizontal growth rather than vertical growth

Vertical growth refers to the classic model of having as many bodies as possible in one place at one time—preferably in the sanctuary for Sunday morning worship. Horizontal growth recognizes that you can be one church in many places at many times. Successful experiments in other churches include weekday and weeknight worship services, meeting in multiple venues, and adopting/merging with other congregations. Linked to the small-group data mentioned earlier, having multiple small worship opportunities can add up to a larger, deeper spiritual connection.

WPC Observation:

• The success of Worship on the Water shows that Westminster already has a great history of using this model. The summer experiment with offering worship at different times is a great opportunity to reach those for whom 10:00 A.M. Sunday morning is not a good fit.
