





World Communion Sunday

The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. Paul tells us (I Cor. 11:21) that we are to "discern the body" when we partake of Holy Communion, mindful that we note our relationship to all our brothers and sisters in Christ in the celebration. One is not to go hungry while another is drunk! This is scandalous behavior opposed to the Way of Christ.



Thus it is appropriate that World Communion Sunday is also

a time when we receive the annual Peace and Global Witness Offering as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with brothers and sisters in need. [Visit pcusa.org to make a contribution.]

Celebration of World Wide Communion
Sunday began in 1933, and was adopted as a
denominational practice in the Presbyterian
Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other
denominations were invited to celebrate
with us from the beginning, but it wasn't
until 1940 when the Department of
Evangelism of the Federal Council of
Churches (a predecessor body of the
National Council of Churches) promoted
extending the celebration to a number of
churches around the world that the practice
became widespread.

Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.

Children's Sabbath Celebration October 19th

The National Observance of Children's Sabbath, sponsored and resourced by the Children's Defense Fund, is a time for



people of all faiths to unite in shared concern for children and common commitment to improving children's lives and working for justice on their behalf.

Children's Sabbath is typically observed sometime in October. This year,

we will celebrate on Sunday, October 19th.

Observance of Children's Sabbaths weekend unites faith communities of every religious tradition across the nation to:

- Raise awareness of problems facing children and families in our nation (such as poverty, gun violence, and lack of health care)
- Explore the texts and teachings in religious traditions that call us to nurture and protect children with love and justice
- Engage people of faith in immediate and long-term action to nurture, protect, and seek justice for children

By participating in this multi-faith, nationwide celebration, people of faith gain the inspiration of participating in a larger movement for children and help amplify the voice of our faith communities calling for justice, especially justice for the youngest and the "least of these."

WPC Supports Filling Empty Bowls on October 16th



Soup, bread, dessert and hundreds of decorative bowls go a long way to fight hunger in Greenwood, and tickets are now available for Empty Bowls Greenwood, the signature fundraiser for Greenwood Soup Kitchen. The Soup Kitchen is an onsite program of Food Bank of the Lakelands.

The food bank has a number of food and nutrition programs: food boxes for senior adults, a food pantry and a mobile one, a weekend backpack

program for school-aged children and more.

Empty Bowls Greenwood has sold out every single year since its inception. According to Andrea M. White, Greenwood Soup Kitchen's executive director, "Our desire is to exceed what we raised last year, which was \$42,590. People understand the mission of the soup kitchen — to take care of our community, with hot meals, six days a week, Monday through Saturday. From January 31 to July 30, Greenwood Soup Kitchen has prepared 12,263 meals. And the soup kitchen is all volunteer-led."

Operating income in August was \$11,632, while operating expenses were \$21,103, resulting in a net operating loss of \$9,471. Committee expenses were \$1,306 above budget due to higher than normal expenses in Worship & Music and Mission & Outreach Committees. Additionally, a major capital expense of \$13,086 was paid out to replace a broken heat pump. This resulted in a net reduction in the checkbook of \$22,557.



To Bear Great Fruit, Be a Great Branch!



Westminster strives to be a vibrant and effective part of the Body of Christ as we diligently pursue our unique mission: to be an inclusive community of faith, abiding in God's love and committed to enjoying God, following Jesus, and growing disciples.

Did you notice that work, *abiding*? Jesus emphasized this idea when speaking to His disciples in the Gospel According to John, chapter 15, verses 4-5:

"Abide in me as I abide in you.

Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine,
neither can you unless you abide in me.
I am the vine; you are the branches.
Those who abide in me and I in them bear much great fruit,
because apart from me you can do nothing."


Westminster has the potential to bear *much* great fruit! When we faithfully abide in the love of Jesus, God can and will use us to bear witness and make this world a better place!



But if we fail to abide...we can do nothing.

Our job, then, as stewards of God's gifts to us, is to be the best branches we can possibly be. **So what does it mean to be a great branch?**

This year, you are urged to pray every day during Stewardship season, thanking God for the great fruit you enjoy in your own life and seeking to hear God's call. To help you do that, the Stewardship ministry team has prepared a daily devotional guide. These devotions provide you with information to help you plan for what your Stewardship Covenant with God and Westminster will be in 2026. You can pick up one in the narthex or the church office. It's also available as a PDF for download on our website's Resources page.



As the devotional guide explains,

"A physical vine branch serves as a **conduit**, carrying water and nutrients from the vine to the growing fruit. It provides **support** for the fruit while it grows. And a branch itself grows, getting **stronger** and longer, all the better to allow even more fruit to be produced.

In the same way, as metaphorical branches, we are inspired to be conduits of God's love into all the world (Mark 16:15), to offer support for all of God's children (Matthew 25:31-46), and to grow stronger as disciples (Ephesians 6:10-18)."

Take time today and every day leading up to Dedication Sunday, November 16, to prayerfully consider how you will show your gratitude to God by being a great branch. Remember that **God always provides for us, and one way that God provides is through** *you***.**

Invitation to Stewardship 2025-2026

Fall is the time of year when your Session invites you into a Stewardship Covenant—a promise to commit some portion of your time, talents, and financial resources to the glory of

God and the work of this congregation. It's a special chance to demonstrate your gratitude to God and your commitment to building Westminster into an evermore robust and fruitful "branch," abiding firmly in Jesus, who is The Vine.

Please spend time each day praying for your church and for discernment about your participation in the

coming year. The Stewardship Devotional Guide (*see page 14*) provides short prayer prompts to stimulate your conversations with God. There's also space provided for you to note your own prayers and especially to journal your gratitude for the many blessings and gifts that God *has* provided, *is* providing, and *will* provide.

During worship in the coming weeks, you'll hear testimony from fellow members of this congregation about their experience serving as "faithful, fruitful branches" through their prayers, participation, and financial support for their church. Giving is a spiritual discipline that promotes congregational engagement and fosters personal spiritual growth.

Be on the lookout for a stewardship packet mailed to your home. In this packet, you will find materials to assist you in prayerfully determining what your grateful response will be to God's generous gifts to us: creation, boundless love, the saving grace freely given through Christ's sacrifice, and the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit within you.

Materials include:

- A letter from your Session and Pastor
- A brochure describing some of Westminster's major focus areas, along with estimated 2026 budget needs for each
- A Stewardship Covenant form for you to use to communicate your commitment for how you will glorify the LORD and serve His church in 2026

The size of your contribution doesn't matter; your willingness to commit yourself to God's mission for Westminster *does*. Every prayer, every volunteer minute, every dollar helps Westminster fulfill our call to be God's hands and feet, salt and light in the world.

Please prayerfully consider how you are being called to engage with God as a faithful, fruitful branch in the coming year:

- **†** How will you make sure all God's children feel included?
- **†** What will you do to strengthen your relationship with God and to abide in love?
 - **†** How will you enjoy God in worship and praise?
- **†** How will you follow Christ through service to your church and your community?
 - **†** What will you do to grow as a disciple yourself and lift up others who are also seeking deeper faith?

2026 Asking Budget: Narrative Summary

Worship & Music

We are called "to glorify and enjoy God forever," so gathering for worship, in person or online, is essential for bearing good fruit. Your support for this work ensures that worshippers are warmly welcomed, and that our worship reflects our gratitude to God. Flowers, honoraria, communion supplies, Dinner Church, and WOW support are among the

items included in this request. This year, we're planning ahead for special music and for kirkin' o' the tartans to continue.

2026 Budget Request: \$12,000

Mission & Outreach

The exhortation to "go into all the world and preach the gospel" makes it clear that mission and outreach are core elements of bearing good fruit. Your support in this area allows us to reach out to the local community and to the world to proclaim the good news, work for justice, and provide for the needs of others. This budget request includes support for local mission partners, Camp Fellowship, special offerings, and outreach materials.

2026 Budget Request: \$13,500

Nurture & Education

Our goal of Being [More] Foundational encourages us to grow our knowledge of the Bible and our Reformed tradition. This team establishes curricula, recruits teachers, secures supplies and study books, and maintains the church library. In 2026, we hope to revitalize our youth and college ministries.

2026 Budget Request: \$10,000

Congregational Care & Fellowship

Fellowship and fun are absolutely essential for building the relationships that define who we are and how we work together to bear good fruit. Part of this team's purpose is to foster relationships by creating opportunities for food, fun, and friendship throughout the year. This includes providing programs and activities for events, managing kitchen operations, and ordering and organizing food and other supplies. The CC&F team also plays a critical role in demonstrating love and providing support for those in our church family who need assistance or encouragement, by praying, visiting, sending notes, and delivering meals.

2026 Budget Request: \$2,000

Business Affairs

Sustaining the Body of Christ requires constant vigilance, action, and frankly, investment. This team handles the important-but-boring "back office" business of the church, including maintaining the facility and grounds. This team oversees church finances, personnel, insurance, office operations, risk management, and administrative needs, such as utilities, office supplies, and the like. This budget covers all of those diverse areas. Staff salary and benefits are included. In 2026, we anticipate significant investment in the building, such as replacing HVAC units.

2026 Administration Request: \$175,000 Building & Grounds Request: \$51,000

Celebrating Service: 2nd Annual College of Elders Dinner

Serving the Body of Christ as an Elder is a blessing, a privilege...and a lot of hard work! Westminster is hosting our second annual College of Elders dinner on October 16th to show our thanks for all who in our midst are ordained Elders, wherever they have served.

In addition to a reception and dinner, our honored Elders will enjoy a presentation from keynote speaker Denise Holland, new Executive Director of United Way of the Lakelands. Her topic is "Living United." Denise describes her role as "working to inspire, and support involvement in various health and human services in the communities in Greenwood, Abbeville, McCormick, and Saluda Counties of SC."




The College of Elders event is also an early invitation for Elders to once again model servant leadership for this church family by entering into a Stewardship Covenant for 2026. The covenant represents a faithful commitment to continue using their spiritual gifts and financial resources to the glory of God and the work of God's church. Elders are urged to bring their completed Stewardship Covenant forms to the dinner, so that they can set a strong giving pace for the rest of the congregation.



Including, Abiding, Enjoying, Following, and Growing

A series exploring Westminster's foundational statements and strategic intention

Back in January, your Session established three strategic directions to guide us in prioritizing our worship and work efforts. The first of these is for us to "Be [More] Foundational." Note that *more* is enclosed in brackets. It's not that we aren't already focused on fundamentals, after all. The point is that, as we make decisions as a church family, our intention is to build on those strengths and do even *more*.



Looking back over our programming in 2025, you see clear evidence that Westminster has made significant strides in this direction. For example, Pastor Caroline designed and delivered a "Presbyterian 101" course that was grounded in an excellent book by Donald K. McKim on PC(USA) beliefs and organizational structures: *Presbyterian Questions, Presbyterian Answers*.

The book was well-received by both newcomers and long-timers. Copies of this book are available at no charge to anyone interested in boning up! Similarly, free copies of the *PC(USA) Book of Order*, *PC(USA) Book of*

Confessions, and a study catechism (i.e., beliefs presented in Q&A format) are all available to those in our family who enjoying digging deeper.

Selection of sermon topics has also been guided by this strategic direction. The series on Good Words, for example, shed light on Biblical and Presbyterian terms that are often misunderstood or even misused, such as *predestination*.

Looking ahead to 2026, how would you like to see Westminster become [more] foundational? Your Session and Pastor are always eager to receive your wisdom and inspiration for moving our church family toward fulfilling our mission, vision, and goals.

Thornwell Today!

Today, Thornwell is the longest-serving children's and family ministry in South Carolina and one of the oldest in the Southeastern U.S. Thornwell's programs and services have innovated and adapted over the last 150 years to meet the current needs of children, families, and communities. Thornwell offers family therapy, parenting classes, residential care, foster care, transitional living, and education services. These programs have expanded to serve areas across South Carolina, Florida, and Georgia.

Meaningful Partnership

Thornwell is a Christian ministry and has a close partnership with the Presbyterian Church (USA), sharing values of faith, service, family, acceptance, excellence, and teamwork. Thornwell has special connections to Westminster Presbyterian Church in Greenwood through legacy relationships, giving, and serving. Due to the proximity to the main campus in Clinton, SC there are many ways to serve, support, and get involved.



Recently, Westminster has participated in serving children and families connected to Thornwell through Supply Drive Luncheon (Pastor Caroline had a special shout-out in 2024) and packing Grab n' Go Meals through the Summer Meal program (total 94,000+ meals served by Thornwell in Summer 2025). Westminster cares deeply about children and families. While Thornwell does so much more than just foster care, we know that foster care and adoption have special impact on the families that call Westminster home.
