
Chalking the Doors

From the PCUSA Book of Common Worship

An old Epiphany tradition involves using chalk to write the letters *CMB* and the numbers of the current year, separated by crosses (+), over the doors of congregations and Christian homes: *20 + C + M + B + 26 or CMB + 2026*.

The letters *CMB* are said to stand for the names of the magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar) or the Latin phrase *Christus mansionem benedicat* (Christ bless this house).

Before or after chalking the doors, the following or a similar prayer may be said:



God of doors and homes,
bless this home this year and every year.

Bless all who come and go through this door,
both those who live here and those who visit.

May all who enter through this door
come in peace and bring joy.

May all who come to this door
find welcome and love.

May the love and joy in this home overflow
and spread into the community and the world. And may Jesus the Christ watch over us all.



This is the Year of Matthew!

Between Epiphany and Lent, the children's Sunday School will focus on the Book of Matthew, with emphasis on Jesus' parables—stories he used to help the Disciples and others understand important ideas about God and the Kingdom of Heaven. We have a new book on the

Parables and an old book about the Gospel of Matthew to help us with our studies.

What makes this “The Year of Matthew”?

Through the centuries, Christians have developed lectionaries—a list of portions of the Bible appointed to be read each day at home or during worship. The purpose of a lectionary is to provide a disciplined approach to reading all the way through the Bible, usually across several years.

Like millions of other churches, Westminster uses the Revised Common Lectionary to guide our readings across three years, labeled Year A, Year B, and Year C. Following this plan, the Church cycles through the Gospels of Matthew (in Year A), Mark (Year B), and Luke (Year C), with John used in all years. In 2026, we are using the Year A readings...and that makes this the Year of Matthew!


Circle Up, Ladies!

Westminster Hosts New Community Wellness Group


When it comes to managing your health and lifestyle, it can be tough to find both the reliable information and the self-discipline that you need. That's why it's **Better Together**!

B&BB: How to Know a Person



Our merry band of Books & Brown Baggers reconvenes on January 7 to dive into David Brooks's new book, *How to Know a Person: The Art of Seeing Others Deeply and Being Deeply Seen*. This book has been characterized as "a practical, heartfelt guide to the art of truly knowing another person and fostering deeper connections at home, at work, and throughout our lives"

Brooks draws from the fields of psychology and neuroscience, and the worlds of theater, philosophy, history, and education to present a welcoming, hopeful, integrated approach to human connection. *How to Know a Person* helps readers become more understanding and considerate toward others, and to find the joy that comes from being seen. It offers a possible remedy for a society that is riven by fragmentation, hostility, and misperception.

The act of seeing another person, Brooks argues, is profoundly creative: How can we look somebody in the eye and see something large in them and, in turn, see something larger in ourselves? *How to Know a Person* is for anyone searching for connection, and yearning to be understood.

Epiphany

January 6th is the twelfth and final day of Christmas, according to the Christian liturgical calendar. It is known as Three King's Day, or the Feast of Epiphany.

Epiphany is the celebration of God's manifestation or self-revelation to the world in Jesus Christ. In particular, we celebrate the revelation of God's promise and purpose to the nations of the world, as the magi came from the East to worship to the Christ child, and God's covenant of grace is extended to all who believe the good news of Christ Jesus.

The symbolism of light is important: not only because of the star that guided the magi, but as it relates to the bright dawning of God's self-revelation in Christ.

For Christians, Christmas marks the coming of God to us; Epiphany celebrates the appearance of the Lord in the midst of humanity. The Christmas stories of the birth of Immanuel declare the divine entry; Epiphany extols the revelation of God to the world in the person of Jesus of Nazareth.

In our celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany we rejoice in the dawning and the arising of Light in darkness. ... Epiphany not only discloses the Savior to the world but also calls the world to show forth Christ, to be witnesses to God's true Light.

The timeless mystery of the incarnation, God in flesh, leads us forth to show and tell of Christ as God's gift of grace and salvation for all persons. Some call this ongoing epiphany the work of Christmas.



Thoughts for MLK Day

Any reflection on the work of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. calls into view particular gifts of his ministry: the application of the gospel to political and social reform; the coupling of cries for justice with public action; and the merger of passion and intellect.

Dr. King, like preachers before him, focused on agape. However, he was radical enough to merge the themes of grace and justice. He brought to the pulpit a social gospel that defined racism as a theological issue and promoted active agape love as a power that could bring political transformation to a nation steeped in discriminatory practice and ideology.

Annual Meeting: January 18th

As part of worship on January 18th, you are invited to participate in our Annual Meeting, as required by the *PC(USA) Book of Order*:

G-1.0502 Annual and Special Meetings

The congregation shall hold an annual meeting and may hold special meetings as necessary, for any or all of the purposes appropriate for congregational consideration.

The business to be transacted at special meetings shall be limited to items specifically listed in the call for the meeting. All active members of the congregation present at either annual or special meetings are entitled to vote.

On the agenda: a report from Session regarding the approved 2026 Operating Budget, and a motion to approve 2026 Terms of Call for retaining our current Pastor. A printed Annual Report will be provided, celebrating 2025 and looking ahead to 2026.

Purcell to Preach January 25th

Elder Installation: January 18th

Westminster is blessed to have numerous faithful workers and leaders in our midst. Each year, we call six of them to serve as Ruling Elders—that is, to be part of our Session (basically, our Board of Directors).



Here's what the *PC(USA) Book of Order* says about being *called*:

W-4.0401 Called to Ministry

In Baptism, each Christian is called to ministry in Christ's name. God calls some persons from the midst of congregations to fulfill particular functions, so that the ministry of the whole people of God may flourish.

In *ordination*, the church sets apart with prayer and the laying on of hands those who have been called by God through the voice of the church to serve as deacons, ruling elders, and ministers of the Word and Sacrament.

In *installation*, the church sets in place with prayer those who have been (previously) ordained as deacons, ruling elders, and ministers of the Word and Sacrament, and are now called anew to service in that ministry.

Ginny Cartee was elected in a congregational meeting on September 28 to serve as a new Ruling Elder. And Rob Graves agreed to serve a second term. Because both of these servant-leaders have already been *ordained*, they simply need now to be *installed* for this new term of service.



We are deeply grateful for the loving and faithful service that Tina Corley has provided during her tenure on the Session.

Taste and See that The Lord is Good Part I: Setting the Table for the New Year

As we move into the New Year, it is tempting to begin loading our “plate,” like a Chinet at a church covered dish, with lots of new things, like: “I will start exercising! Take up quilting or golf! Read through the Bible this year!”



Before long, our plate is overloaded and we haven’t even gotten to the dessert table. This year, before you add more to your plate, try this New Year’s Day reflection:


- 1) **What is already on your plate?** What are the must-haves? The meat and potatoes? Work, time with family and friends, housekeeping, self-care, time with God.... How are these things working for you? Are they good? Do they need some seasoning? Some reworking? How’s the balance? Too much work? Not enough rest?
- 2) **What needs to come off the plate?** What’s on the plate that is not good for you? More than you can stomach?
- 3) **What can you add?** Is there space now to add something new or give more time to something old?
- 4) **Say Grace.** Give thanks to God for what is on your plate and ask God’s blessing on it.

God of the feast, you are great and good.

I thank you for all that is on my plate: for good work to do, for friends, and family, for time with your word, meaningful contributions to my community, restorative recreation, opportunities for learning and growth, even for challenges that help me lean into strength and peace, your wisdom and your word.

Bless, O Lord, this food to my use and me to your service.

Taste and See that The Lord is Good Part II: Making Good Choices

Faced with a full smorgasbord of tasty temptations, then, how can we choose wisely which ones are *worthy* of a place on the plate? Psalm 119:105 holds the answer: “Thy Word is lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path.”

As we enter into the New Year, we are invited to be like the Magi who followed a star to God’s greatest gift, a child born for us—for *all* of us! We understand that star to be the Word of God written in our scriptures and incarnated in Christ, which God has given us to be a lamp to our feet and a light to our path.

In years past, we at Westminster have celebrated Epiphany by receiving a word for the year, a Star Word, that was to be for us a guiding light in the year ahead. Some years, star words



were given to us. Some years, we selected words of our own; words like: faith, joy, peace, curiosity, hope, kindness, gentleness, hunger, thirst, prayer, praise, rooted...

This year, when you come to worship on January 4, you will be given a star, and on the star will be a scripture reference. Each person will get a different scripture reference. Consider letting that scripture be a guiding light for you in the coming year. On January 11, Baptism of the Lord Sunday, we will spend some time in worship talking about the scripture we received, where it finds us at the beginning of the year and the way it may be for us a light for the path ahead.

At Westminster, our Mission Statement affirms that we are committed to growing disciples. Part of that means nurturing *ourselves* as disciples by reading, studying, and following God's word. Allowing this one "star scripture" to be a guiding light is one way to do that. And we challenge and encourage you to do more! Here are some ideas for items that *are* worthy choices for your 2026 plate:



The Bible in a Year

Is this the year you will read through the entire Bible? There are many good reading plans that can be found online. We recommend gathering a small group of committed folks to commit to a year with the Bible using, James E. Davison's book, *The Year of the Bible*.

Connecting With Christians Around the World

Perhaps you feel called to spend time with the scriptures for the week (or day) from the Revised Common Lectionary. Christians around the world focus on these prescribed scriptures in their personal devotion and corporate worship. You can find the scriptures for the week or day at the PCUSA Website <https://pcusa.org/devotion/revised-common-lectionary> or through Vanderbilt University at <https://lectionary.library.vanderbilt.edu/>. Our Session stays connected with the lectionary using the *Disciplines Devotion Book* from the Upper Room press.

Connecting with or Forming a Small Group

Christian disciples grow better in groups. Our Monday night *BEMA Bible Study* participants will testify that their multi-year journey together through God's word has reignited their faith, making them not only more knowledgeable about the Bible, but also more curious. While this BEMA group is two years into their journey, many have expressed an interest in starting a new group. Is that you? Our Monday night BEMA group facilitators, Luke and Gloria Christie would love to talk with you about how to begin.

Information about other existing small groups can be found in Westminster Happenings and on pages 5-6. Perhaps you'd like to start a *new* circle of women (or men, or young folks, or college students, or jazz junkies, or movie enthusiasts...) to study God's word together weekly or monthly. Our pastor and our Nurture and Education Ministry Team will be glad to help you find resources for your study.

Whether it is holding onto your Star Scripture for the year, reading through the Bible in a year, daily devotions in the Revised Common Lectionary, or joining or forming a small group, we pray that you will find yourself growing as a student and follower of Christ as you journey in the light of His word.

We received **15% more** stewardship covenant forms than we did at this time last year, and the number of volunteers for the dozens of activities we laid out has broken WPC records!

We're grateful to all who are ready "to church" with us in 2026. As we often say: It's the people, not the building, that make up the Church.

The surplus available for normal operations is \$10,118, which excludes memorials and special offerings..

The Most Expensive Habit: Anxiety

I don't gamble. I don't spend recklessly. But I *do* have an expensive habit: anxiety. It's cost me hours of sleep, moments with my family, and opportunities I let pass because I was too caught up in my fears. It's the vacation I didn't enjoy, the dinner I spoiled, the car ride I spent stressing instead of being present in the moment.



Seneca, a Stoic philosopher of Ancient Rome, said, "We suffer more in imagination than in reality." Anxiety drags us into a future that doesn't exist, forcing us to live out worst-case scenarios that rarely happen. And yet, the time and energy anxiety steals are gone forever.

The good news? If anxiety comes from within us, we can choose to let it go. Marcus Aurelius put it simply: "Today I escaped from anxiety. Or no, I discarded it, because it was within me." And Seneca sums it up, saying, "He who suffers before it is necessary suffers more than is necessary."

Anxiety doesn't change the outcome—it only punishes me before anything has even happened. It's not easy to break free, but we can practice—by staying in the present moment, letting go of what we can't control, and reminding ourselves that anxiety is an expensive habit.

As Christians guided by the lamp of the Word, we have very clear instructions in Philippians on how we are to deal with anxiety:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.
