This I Believe

In the 1950s, there was a radio program that went by the title of this article. It was hosted by the acclaimed journalist, Edward R. Murrow. Each day, Americans gathered by their radios to hear compelling essays from the likes of Eleanor Roosevelt, Jackie Robinson, Helen Keller, and Harry Truman as well as corporate leaders, cab drivers, scientists, and secretaries—anyone who was able to distill in a few minutes the guiding principles by which they lived. These essays, it is reported, "brought comfort and inspiration to a country worried about the Cold War, McCarthyism, and racial division."


Over the years, this radio program has been revived, and now has become a global project in partnership with Henry Holt and Company, gathering "This I Believe" essays into books and school curricula.

What is it that *you* believe, and how does it guide the way you live your life?

In worship, after we hear God's word read and proclaimed, we respond with prayer, offerings, and a declaration of faith. Most often, we use the Apostles Creed, but we have a whole book from which to choose our Confession of Faith.

This Book of Confessions is a collection of statements made by the church since the Reformation. Some statements cover spiritual basics: Who is God? Jesus? The Holy Spirit? What do we believe about Holy Scripture? Communion? Baptism? Some statements were made in response to critical historical moments like the rise of Christian Nationalism under Hitler, Racism in America, or Apartheid in South Africa.

The Book of Confessions (this collection of statements) and the Book of Order make up the constitution of the



Presbyterian Church USA, our denomination. The Book of Order has this to say about the confessional statements found in the Book of Confessions:

The Presbyterian Church (USA) states its faith and bears witness to God's grace in Jesus Christ in the creeds and confessions in the Book of Confessions. In these statements the church declares to its members and to the world who and what it is, what it believes and what it resolves to do. (BOO F-2.01)

Who we are. What we believe. What we resolve to do.


At the dawn of this new year, I invite each of us—and all of us—to a time of learning and

reflection. Who are you? What do you believe? And based on that belief, how do you resolve to live? How will you act in times of equilibrium? And in times of strife or crisis? How will your faith guide you?

Who are we as a church? What do we believe? How will our belief guide our life together as a church?

How will we start? Perhaps each of us will start by listening to or reading some of the "This I Believe" essays found at thisibelieve.org. And then writing "This I Believe" essays of our own to share with our church family.




At church, we will start with a Sunday School Class (more details below) and a sermon series (more information on page 3) to learn more about the creed we say together most Sundays, the Apostles Creed. This creed is a faith statement about what we believe. We will explore these faith statements along with the question, "If this is what we say we believe, how does that shape the way we live?"

The beginning of the year is often a time for resolutions. This year we have the opportunity to step back from what we resolve to do and take a look at the underlying assumptions that guide our resolutions. "I believe this... therefore, I resolve to do this."

What do you believe? How does this belief shape the way you live? The way you resolve to live differently in the year to come?

"Christians, What Do You Believe?"

Every Sunday, we affirm our faith during worship, and much of the time, we do so by reciting together The Apostle's Creed. But what are we *really* saying? What *deeper* message can be found in those familiar words?

Beginning Sunday, January 7th, the Adult Sunday Study group will strive to answer those questions and more through the new Adam Hamilton study, *Creed: What Christians Believe and Why*. Hamilton believes that

some powerful answers to important life questions are contained in the Apostles' Creed, an early statement of foundational Christian beliefs. In this book, Hamilton considers important questions of life, reality, and truth. He explores not only what Christians believe, but also why they believe it and why it matters.

Our weekly study meets at 9:00 A.M. on Sunday mornings in the Choir Room. New to church? New to adult studies? This is a great opportunity to jump in and explore some core beliefs that have the power to change your life!

January/February Sermon Series: This I Believe

What is the solid ground upon which you stand? Do you trust wholeheartedly in wisdom your parents taught you? Has your own experience given you solid wisdom? What of this faith we profess and practice? Is it something that has been passed down to you by family or culture, or have you claimed it as your own firm foundation?



In this sermon series, we will be exploring the foundations of

our faith as described in the Apostles Creed, a statement we say together most Sundays, but that you may have some questions—or even doubts—about. Jesus welcomes those who have doubts and questions. So do we! Exploring these doubts and questions with trusted partners helps us lay a foundation for a stronger faith.

2024 Souper Bowl of Caring Kick Off

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in." (from Matthew 25:35)

"Are you ready for some football?" (from every sports announcer in America)

How on Earth are these two ideas possibly connected?!?

On Super Bowl Sunday, February 11, Westminster is once again joining forces with the non-profit organization "Tackle Hunger" to raise money for the Souper Bowl of Caring. Our funds will go to the Greenwood Soup Kitchen, feeding the hungry right here in our own community.



Why are we participating?

- More than 24 million households in America do not have enough food to live a healthy lifestyle.
- 11.6 million households with children do not have enough food.
- 1 in 5 children in our United States are food insecure.
- 25.1% of households in Greenwood, SC have income below the poverty level.

Neilson has done a deep-dive survey into the viewership of the last two Super Bowls. They came up with a figure of 208 million people having viewed the Super Bowl in 2022. Just imagine if everyone watching the Super Bowl this year gave \$1.00 to help those households in need!

While we have no control over that, we *can* control what action we take in our own community. Westminster has a terrific track record:

- In 2022, we gave \$279 to this cause.
- In 2023, we raised our game to donate \$703 to the Greenwood Soup Kitchen
- In 2024, the sky's the limit!

Come mid-January, it will be time to bring out our fantastic football field and dust off the old soup pot that your generosity will fill. Look for more exciting details to come in bulletins starting in 2024!

January: What is *Epiphany*?

January 6th is the twelfth and final day of Christmas, according to the Christian liturgical calendar. It is known as Three King's Day, or the Feast of Epiphany.



Epiphany is the celebration of God's manifestation or selfrevelation to the world in Jesus Christ. In particular, we celebrate the revelation of God's promise and purpose to

EPIPHANY the nations of the world, as the magi came from the East to worship to the Christ child, and God's covenant of grace is extended to all who believe the good news of Christ Jesus. The symbolism of light is important: not only because of the star that guided the magi, but as it relates to the bright dawning of God's selfrevelation in Christ.

The word *epiphany* (from the Greek *epiphaneia* or *theophaneia*) means *appearance* or *manifestation* of God, and has roots in the word for sunrise or dawn. In ancient times, an epiphany meant either a visible manifestation of a god or the solemn visit of a ruler venerated as a god.

For Christians, Christmas marks the coming of God to us; Epiphany celebrates the appearance of the Lord in the midst of humanity. The Christmas stories of the birth of Immanuel declare the divine entry; Epiphany extols the revelation of God to the world in the person of Jesus.

In our celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany, we rejoice in the dawning and the arising of Light in darkness. ... The timeless mystery of the incarnation, God in flesh, leads us forth to show and tell of Christ as God's gift of grace and salvation for all persons. Some call this ongoing epiphany the work of Christmas.

February: What is *Shrove Tuesday?*

Shrove Tuesday is the day immediately preceding Ash Wednesday (see below), the beginning of Lent in Western churches. *Shrove*, derived from *shrive*, refers to the confession of sins before Lent, a usual practice in Europe in the Middle Ages.

Although the day is sometimes still used for self-examination and introspection, Shrove Tuesday eventually acquired the character of a carnival or festival in many places and is often celebrated with parades; e.g., Mardi Gras ("Fat Tuesday") in New Orleans, Louisiana.

As the final day before the austerity of the Lenten fast, Shrove Tuesday also has many customs pertaining to food. Pancakes are traditional in a number of European countries because eggs, sugar, and fat, commonly forbidden during the Lenten fast, are used up so they will not go to waste.

What is Ash Wednesday?



Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the 40-day season of Lent. This transformational season moves us from sin to salvation, as we hear the epic

stories of our faith and contemplate our place in them.

The sign we receive on Ash Wednesday, ashes in the shape of a cross, is a reminder of both our mortality and our salvation. We come to this service to confess, perhaps even to claim our emptiness, and to be filled again, created again, by the life renewing Spirit of God, made known to us in the life-giving sacrifice of Jesus.

February: What is *Lent?*

Lent is a season of 40 days, beginning with Ash Wednesday (February 14th this year) and ending on the Thursday (March 28th) before Good Friday. Just as Advent is a season of waiting and preparation for the coming of Christ, Lent is a season of waiting and preparing for the new life we have come to know in Christ, a life of intimate connection with God and neighbor, empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Biblically, 40 is a number that signifies transformation. Through prayer and devotional practices, we hope to grow through these 40 days. Plan to join us at Westminster as we begin the Lenten Season together with our Ash Wednesday service on February 13th.

Did you do the math? Why are there more than 40 days between those two dates? Because each Sunday is a little Easter!


Count all the days except the Sundays, and you should come up with 40. Many people commit to a discipline during the 40 days of Lent, like the discipline of doing a small kindness every day, or the discipline of dedicating a period of time each day to prayer, or the discipline of giving up something that may stand in the way of your commitment to loving God and neighbor, like television or chocolate.

What will you do in these 40 days to open yourself up to the way that God is shaping you for a resurrected life? These days ahead of Lent are a good time to listen and discern your Lenten practice.

The results are in, and once again, the giving hearts of the Westminster family have faithfully and generously committed to supporting our worship, programs, and outreach for the coming year financially and through sharing your gifts and talents.

Out of 45 possible family units that might have made financial commitments, 37 did so (82%). That number includes 8 pledges from people who have not pledged in the past, and 5 who increased their

amount. All together, the pledges totaled almost \$200,000. That is an amazing achievement for such a small congregation! It is worth noting that we are one of only two congregations our size in Trinity Presbytery that can sustain a full-time pastor.

At a called meeting on Sunday, December 10, your Session applied some careful cuts to the original asking budget, and successfully approved a solid fiscal plan for 2024. This final budget will be presented as part of the annual meeting on Sunday, January 14th.

Pray for God to continue guiding Westminster and providing for us abundantly. If you made a financial commitment, please be attentive to making your contributions in whatever timing works best for you. And if you didn't pledge, no worries! • **Track gratitude and achievement with a journal.** Include 3 things you were grateful for and 3 things you were able to accomplish each day.



- **Start your day with a cup of coffee.** Coffee consumption is linked to lower rates of depression. If you can't drink coffee because of the caffeine, try another good-for-you drink like green tea.
- **Experiment** with a new recipe, write a poem, paint or try a Pinterest project. Creative expression and overall well-being are linked.
- Show some love to someone in your life. Close, quality, relationships are key for a happy, healthy life.
- Boost brainpower by treating yourself to a couple pieces of dark chocolate every few days. The flavonoids, caffeine, and theobromine in chocolate are thought to work together to improve alertness and mental skills.
- Feeling anxious? Take a trip down memory lane and do some coloring for about 20 minutes to help you clear your mind. Pick a design that's geometric and a little complicated for the best effect.
- **Take time to laugh.** Hang out with a funny friend, watch a comedy or check out cute videos online. Laughter helps reduce anxiety.
- **Spend some time with a furry friend.** Time with animals lowers the stress hormone cortisol and boosts oxytocin. which stimulates feelings of happiness.
