Bearing Much Great Fruit in 2026

Throughout 2025, you have demonstrated your grateful response to God's generosity by being generous yourselves with your time, talents, and financial support. Thanks to your prayerful and powerful covenant commitments during this stewardship season, we witness to the bountiful harvest possible when a people abide in God's inclusive love.

Above and beyond meeting our day-to-day operational needs, WPC continues to maintain a strong investment balance that generates income while remaining readily accessible for major capital investments and emergency expenditures. At the close of 2025, our reserve fund balance increased over last year by \$17,500 to an end of year balance of \$279,500. In addition to the reserve fund, there are \$17,000 in memorial funds held in our investment account at the close of 2025.

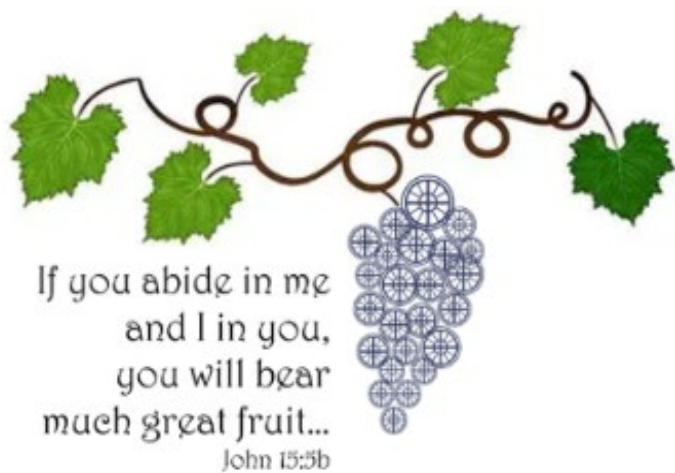

At the beginning of the year, your Session adopted our new mission statement, and you have been living into it ever since.

The year kicked off with a breakfast hosted by our Congregational Care and Fellowship Team highlighting the many opportunities to make yourself at home at Westminster by engaging in small groups facilitated by our Nurture and Education Ministry Team. Through Presbyterian Women, Brown Bags and Books, BEMA Podcast Discussion Group, Sunday Adult Study, Men's Fellowship Lunch, and even a small group of women who gather weekly to prepare lessons for our children, there are more than 65 adult engagements each week which deepen participant's faith and connection through study and fellowship. These gatherings often result in action outside the walls of our church. Our hope in the year to come is that every WPC church family member, adult, youth, and children, find a place of connection where we can abide together and grow together in God's love.

This is just one snapshot of the abundance this year abiding in Christ has brought forth. This report contains many more. May you rejoice as you read through this report in remembering all that God is doing at Westminster, as a gardener rejoices in the time of harvest. The Business Affairs Ministry Team is tasked with making sure we have a safe and working environment in which to conduct the Church's ministry. We also ensure that Church operations run smoothly. It has been an interesting year of learning for this first-time committee chair! Here are a few 2025 highlights from BAMT's areas of responsibility: Administration, Building & Grounds, Finance, and Personnel.

Finance

The loss of Len Bornemann this past year was a foundational loss to Westminster as a whole. For our Ministry Team, Len was a wonderful Treasurer and trusted advisor who guided us well. We are grateful to David Hammond for agreeing to fill this role. He has already made his expert mark on our monthly finances and budget planning processes.



Facilities & Grounds

There's nothing like the loss of air conditioning in the summer to help set priorities for facility improvements! This past year, we replaced two of the 13 HVAC units, including the critical one responsible for heating and cooling the

Fellowship Hall hallway and kitchen. These new units will serve us for many years to come. However, we do still have a number of aging units that we will be keeping an eye on and planning for replacement once they've lived past their lifespan. We've had a successful year of volunteer efforts for ground beautification with three work days. Both inside and out, worker bees were effective in keeping our Church looking first class. One of the biggest improvements was the removal of an aging tree in the courtyard (stump and all!), replacing it with shrubbery that creates an open and welcoming environment.

Our kitchen received a new sink faucet and window frame replacement with near-term plans for even more improvements to this critical resource.

A steering committee is being formed to take a longer view of the strategic needs of our facilities, prioritizing, costing and fundraising for the capital improvements that Westminster Presbyterian will need in the upcoming decade to keep our facilities safe, functioning and more accessible.

Personnel

We were thrilled to work with our Office Manager, Charleston, to cover for her during her maternity leave with a team of volunteers. In return, her new baby has graced our offices on occasion while momma works! It has been a wonderful blessing!



New computers have been provided to both our Pastor and Office Manager which should cover their technology needs for the next few years.

Policies and Procedures

Slowly, but steadily, a Policies and Procedures book is being created that will govern how our Church operates, keeps us in compliance with government and Presbytery policies and will provide direction to how we react in various scenarios.

The mission of the Worship and Music Ministry Team is to work prayerfully with the Pastor and other worship leaders to engage the congregation in weekly and seasonal services of Spirit-filled worship that provide for the reading and proclamation of God's Word, the celebration of the sacraments, music, art, and space. The goal of every worship service is to glorify God and to create a space where every congregant can enjoy God.

Weekly Worship

Westminster Presbyterian Church gathers for worship at 10:00 am. Our Sacred Spaces team makes sure that the paraments match the liturgical season, that fresh flowers adorn the sanctuary, and that the narthex is neat, warm, and welcoming.

The Worship and Music Ministry Team also provides for weekly liturgists and worship hosts. We are delighted that as Westminster's congregation grew in 2025, so did our roster of liturgists and hosts!



Communion is served on the first Sunday of each month. This year we began also serving Communion to homebound congregants once per quarter. Congregation members remember those who struggle to receive their daily bread by bringing items to stock the Greenwood County Food Bank on Communion Sundays.

Our Tech team makes sure the spoken and sung word can be heard by both those worshiping in person and those worshiping remotely. The team implemented several enhancements to the online worship experience this year, including making the livestream available directly on Westminster's website.

We partner with the Nurture and Education Ministry Team to prepare KITS, or "Kids in the Sanctuary" worship packets, and other age-appropriate materials for our children each week. What a joy it was to see our growing kids take a more active role in worship services this year!

Music

Our Music team provides for an organist or pianist every Sunday as well as vocal leadership and special music throughout the year. 2025 challenged us to make a joyful noise in creative, nontraditional ways, as several of our faithful keyboardists and vocalists could not offer their gifts as regularly and fill-in church musicians are in short supply. But we sang on, accompanied by organ, piano, bagpipes, guitar, viola, and harmonica; once, we even sang a cappella!

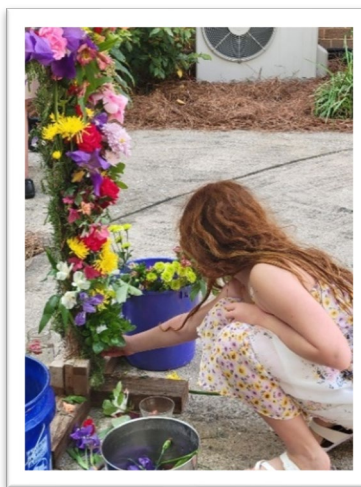

Finally, we are grateful for the honoraria budget that made it possible to welcome many guest musicians this year: Beverly Psomas, Kristen Blackmon, Sara Waldrep, Amy Fennell, Benjamin Watkins, and Bradley Fuller (piano); Rodney Cleveland and Will Cleveland (organ/piano); Michaela Winfrey, Laura Margaret Fennell, Charlie Fennell, and Nickie Murphy (vocals); Silas Schiera (cello); Lyman Golden (guitar); David McLeod (bagpipes).

Special Worship Services

Our Sacred Spaces team helps us prepare for special seasons and services including Ash Wednesday, Lent, Palm Sunday, Easter, Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. During Lent and Holy Week, a cross is placed on our front lawn and draped with purple, black, or white cloth to note the successive seasons of preparation, lament, and celebration. During Advent, Sacred Spaces helps the congregation decorate the sanctuary. Congregation members sponsor lilies for Easter and poinsettias for Christmas in honor or memory of loved ones.

Special worship services are held annually on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Christmas Eve. In 2025, we also held a Service for Healing and Wholeness in November to provide a space of contemplative worship for those coping with sickness, stress, and grief.



This year, it was our joy to participate in the marriage of Westminster members, David Bell and Luann Sellers, on May 3. With hearts full of both sadness and joy, we also celebrated the life of Len Bornemann with a Service of Witness to the Resurrection

on November 15. Thank you to Presbyterian Women and the Congregational Care and Fellowship Ministry Team for providing a lovely reception for Len's funeral and other special services throughout the year!

Hosting Trinity Presbytery



Westminster had the joy of hosting the Stated Meeting of Trinity Presbytery on May 17, 2025. Our congregation and campus welcomed commissioners from the presbytery's 50+ member churches,

an all-hands collaboration between Worship and Music, Congregational Care and Fellowship, and Building and Grounds (part of Business Affairs). The day consisted of a beautiful worship service, business meeting, and fellowship over two delicious meals prepared by Chef Rob and his kitchen crew.

Summer at Westminster

Although the summer months find us in the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, summer at Westminster is anything but ordinary! From Memorial Day Sunday through Labor Day Sunday, Beth and David Hammond and Nancy and Larry Dozier coordinate Worship on the Water (WOW) at Fellowship Camp and Conference Center, a joy-filled worship service and outreach ministry that falls under the care of WPC's Mission and Outreach Ministry Team.

On the third Sunday of June, July, and August, Westminster also hosts Dinner Church, an intergenerational evening worship service in our Fellowship Hall. A collaboration among Mission and Outreach, Worship and Music,

and Congregational Care and Fellowship, Dinner Church combines mission and creative activities with an interactive service of worship that takes place around the dinner table.

Kirkin o' the Tartans

On September 7, 2025, Westminster held its first-ever Kirkin' o' the Tartans, a special worship service celebrating the Scottish heritage of the Presbyterian Church. Our wee Kirkin' honored the olden Scots' love of scripture and devotion to the Kirk (church) with a procession of colorful tartans (family plaids), powerful preaching, and stirring music! David McLeod and Tim Rogers played the bagpipes and snare drum respectively, and soloist Nickie Murphy offered a gorgeous rendition of "Brother James's Air" as an offertory anthem. The service was followed by a reception in the courtyard featuring yummy treats prepared by Congregational Care and Fellowship. The Kirkin' was a glorious service that we hope to make an annual tradition.

Growing as a MATTHEW 25 CHURCH

Our Ministry Team and the Session leapt at this challenge in all three Core Pillars:

- **Building congregational vitality** by challenging congregations and their members to deepen and energize their faith and grow as joyful leaders and disciples actively engaged with their community, seeing new disciples engaged in ministry and longstanding believers develop in faith as the gospel of Jesus Christ is shared in word and deed.

- **Dismantling structural racism** by fearlessly applying our faith to advocate and break down the systems, practices, and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice, and oppression of people of color.
- **Eradicating systemic poverty** by acting on our beliefs and working to change laws, policies, plans, and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

If this sounds like a lot, it's because it is! The Mission and Outreach Ministry Team will be doubling down on our efforts to educate ourselves, the Session, the congregation, and our community on what it means to be a Matthew 25 Church with our words and our deeds. In 2026, we will seek to focus primarily on the first pillar, Congregational Vitality, remembering that when we grow as disciples, we will naturally move towards the acts of mercy and justice elevated by the other two pillars.



Outreach and Service to the Community:

In 2025, we held an End of Life series hosted by various experts covering several topics: "Where is God at the End of Life?", "Walking Your Loved Ones Home" (led by our very own Dr. Nancy Hart Wicker!), "Celebrating Life: Making Funeral Plans," "Good Grief", and "Caring for Caregivers."

One of our newest members, Karl Schwarmann, jumped right in and got up to his

elbows in ...tacos! He heard the cry go out for people to feed the Emerald High School Marching Band during Band Camp and he had us answering in no time flat! He led us as we put together a taco bar for the students. You can't go wrong when your new members take on leadership roles.

Westminster is a true family, and families take care of their own. We spent a wonderful workday at the Alexanders'. If you need someone to drive your tractor, Bill Kimler is now an expert!

Speaking of Bill, our social media network has expanded to over 650 followers across four platforms! We even live streamed the flowering of the cross and the outside portion of our Christmas service!

Our church continued its growth as an all-inclusive community of Christ by joining Covenant Network of Presbyterians and More Light Presbyterians. Both organizations help churches connect with the LGBTQIA+ communities in a genuine way and help members of the community find churches who will welcome them with open arms.

Partnerships With and Support of WPC Committees and Groups

We continued our partnership with Music and Worship through an extended and incredibly successful Worship on the Water. We also worked with Congregational Care and Fellowship to put on Dinner Church again this year. Presbyterian Women once again served dinner to the staff at the Free Clinic.



Partnerships With Mission Partners

Our partnership with the Toddler Learning Center continues, and we revel in their success and growth! We watched the first TLC graduating class through the proud eyes of family.

We made sandwiches at Dinner Church for the Greenwood Soup Kitchen/ Food Pantry and continued our food and supply drive for them, as well.

This time with the Healthy Learner's Spelling Bee, we thought ahead and collected money at Sunday Sustenance for buy backs to help us out in a pinch. Our team of Laine Horowitz, Autumn Mossman, Liz Watson, and Nancy Hart Wicker made it to the last round, went out on a word almost everybody went out on, (OK, so we had a LOT of money for buybacks thanks to donations), and probably had more fun than just about any team there.



Becca Dobbins, a staff member of Thornwell and a friend to Westminster and asked us to come help Thornwell with their mission to help United Way deliver meals in Laurens County. We went up on two Tuesdays: one day we bagged the meals, and one day we went to a mobile distribution site. Our active involvement in missions is helping our team grow!

WPC is good at jumping on an opportunity! When Spears Alexander fondly remembered caroling in his childhood church and agreed to arrange for the church to sing at Wesley Commons, a multi-generational group quickly formed and joyfully sang, to the pleasure of a room full of residents, our own Mary Corley included.

M & O of course, partnered with MEGS House for our Angel Tree. All angels were immediately taken and all presents returned. A community's vitality is primarily its spiritual strength and its capacity for purposeful mission. A mother and daughter were able to have a wonderful Christmas through the growing vitality of our congregation. What a way to end a Mission and Outreach Annual Session Report!

The Congregational Care and Fellowship Ministry Team focuses on sharing the love of Jesus Christ to those among us... visitors, friends, and members.

We know that Jesus loved to eat with disciples, rich folk, poor folk, tax collectors and sinners, dear friends and family. So do we! So, food is big part of the work of the CC&F Ministry Team.

In 2025, our team worked with individuals, other ministry teams, and small groups such as Presbyterian Women and Brown Bags and Books to provide table fellowship monthly at our Sunday Sustenance meals, special receptions for graduates, new babies, and



newlyweds, a brand new Pride gathering in June, and a bereavement brunch in November. The team kicked off 2025 with an all-church breakfast in partnership with Nurture and Education to promote

engagement in small groups and worked with Mission and Outreach and Music and Worship to host our three Dinner Church gatherings in June, July, and August.

Our team makes sure that the kitchen is stocked with materials needed to prepare and serve meals and oversees spaces used for fellowship, including the Fellowship Hall and Kitchen.

Our men enjoy getting together for table fellowship at Greenwood lunch spots each Wednesday at noon for Westminster Wednesdays. From time to time, Presbyterians Pop Up for an outing. This year, a highlight was a trip to Greenville in September to see the play "Come from Away," participate in the talk back with Caroline and Phillip Dennis, and conclude with dinner at a nearby restaurant.

Our team also makes sure that folks who are ailing have the sustenance they need by bringing meals or groceries, and the good food of friendship through a listening ear,

a warm hand to hold, or a shoulder to cry on. Our Ministry Team also helps members stay connected by reaching out to members who can't be with us in person, checking in on members and friends we haven't seen in a while, and helping new members find their place in the community. This year this ministry team collaborated with Music and Worship to extend the Communion Table by taking home communion to members and friends who are not able to worship with us in person.



Our team works with the pastor to keep the prayer list up to date and encourage individual intercessory prayers or gathering for weekly prayers via Zoom.

Our Church Mice know that everyone likes to get a special note on their birthday, so they take care of that. We also believe it is important to teach the children to participate in acts of service. Our children love coming up to help set up Sunday Sustenance. On Mondays, Sanctuary flowers are rearranged and delivered to friends and members as a greeting from the church.

In 2025 our ministry team was pleased to see our team of Sunday Sustenance helpers grow and diversify, help coordinate snacks for Vacation Bible Camp.

In 2026 the CC&F Ministry Team hopes to continue building friendships as we show up for one another in times of need, celebrate with one another in times of joy, share simple meals when we gather, and go out on adventures together, always growing as disciples of Jesus Christ.

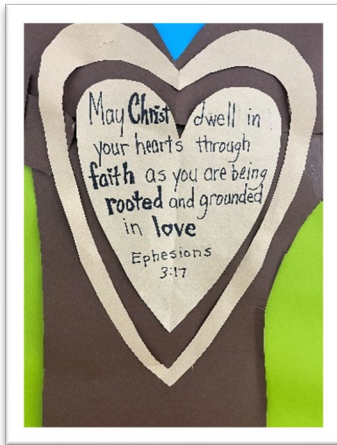
- ❖ Sunday School hour for children, youth, and adults.

Children's Ministry

Kathy Gillespie coordinates our children's ministry. The children's ministry team includes Kathy Gillespie, Kathy West, Kathleen Watkins, Denise Waldrep, Rob Graves, Tina Corley, Mary Frances Thomson, and Karl Schwarzmenn. These volunteers enjoy partnering with our childcare workers, Oliver Danner and Ellery DeRosa to care for the children in Sunday School. Oliver and Ellery also assist families in worship. Oliver moved on to full time life in Columbia this summer, and Ellery completed her student teaching and secured a position in Columbia, at the end of the year. We wish them both the very best and continue to be grateful for the impact they have had on young and old alike.

Families are nourished in faith through Child Care, Sunday School, KITS (kids in the sanctuary packets) that enhance the worship experience for young worshippers and their families, providing lectionary based child friendly activities related to the sermon.

Week by week this year, our children have read, discussed, written and illustrated a scripture verse in their Scripture Journal. They are taking these verses to heart! The year began with scriptures about love then in the summer we learned about the Apostle Paul and moved into the fall with the rest of the congregation on a study of the nine Fruits of the Spirit. We always like to connect the children with what the adults are doing, so they were excited to weave tartans for our first ever Wee Kirking Sunday! Our children took a trip around the world learning about Christmas customs in other lands, some, like the evergreen tree which have made it into our celebrations.



The children enjoy serving their church.
